After many years in this profession he has reached the point of being able to communicate without text, and the image he creates can speak for themselves. At the very least, they can show what the text does not explain. As a devoted animal lover, he has embraced a vegan lifestyle and through his art he advocates for respect for the environment and all living beings.

He's the author of books such as *I Diari di Rubha Hunish, La musica della neve, II Geopoeta.* In 2021 he cofounded Fram Produzioni with Lorenzo Pavolini creating original podcasts (*Nelle Tracce Del Lupo*). His geopoetic work resulted in a wide ranging project for *Bodo2024 European Capital of Culture.* Sapienza is also renowned for his work on Jack London (also as part of *The Complete Works for* Oxford Uni Press) and Barry Lopez. For Logos Edizioni he is currently working on some of London's illustrated short stories.

Elin Stengrundet

is associate professor at Western Norway University of Applied Sciences. Her main research interests are 19th century Norwegian literature, and the representation of youth in the literary canon.
